OPENING OF MEETING

Mr. Corman called the meeting to order at 6:04 PM with Mr. Corman, Mr. Fiedeldey, Mr. Ritter, and Mrs. Harlow in attendance.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mr. Reuter requested the Board would adjourn to executive session for the purpose of discussing the compensation and benefits of a public employee, specifically a grievance filed by the Fire Union; the appointment of a public employee or official, specifically an appointment to the Zoning Commission; and pending/imminent litigation.

At 5:07 PM, Mr. Ritter made such motion and Mr. Fiedeldey offered the second. No discussion and the roll was called:

At 7:19 PM the Board reconvened. Mr. Reuter restated the purpose of executive session and said no actions were made in Executive Session.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mr. Corman offered an invocation and all recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENTATION**Mr. Pat DeWine, Hamilton County Jails**

Mr. DeWine said he has been traveling to Townships with a 20 minute presentation about County government. He provided an abbreviated version of that presentation. He said that they are working on abating population loss, improving care at Drake Hospital. He said that the biggest issue is public safety and a problem with that is a lack of jail space. A sales tax levy would be on the ballot in November. He is focused on reducing government cost, especially with managed competition.

In response to Mr. Ritter, Mr. DeWine said the most like location for the new jail would be near downtown, possibly Queensgate or Camp Washington.

Mr. Fiedeldey asked about \$225 million cost for 1,800 bed jail, which seems excessive to him. He would entertain building the minimum requirement and not a monument. It could be design-build and based on a not-to-exceed figure. He said that \$38 million/year would be generated by a ¼ cent sales tax increase or \$75 million by ½ cent sales tax increase. He would like to see a ½ cent sales tax increase for three years. He said that it might be a disadvantage for three years, but for the next 15 years, it would be an advantage.

Mr. DeWine said those are good points. The \$225 million is based on the jail consultant's estimate for similar-sized facilities. He said the cost depends on who you are housing: maximum security versus minimum. We need more secure housing as well as housing for those with specialized medical needs. He said they have hired an independent design firm to try to lower the cost estimate. He agrees with Mr. Fiedeldey that there is some logic to getting the debt paid off sooner.

Mr. Corman said that we have seen this type of situation in the last half of the 20th century. He said there is more expense to harbor these criminals. These are societal issues. He said that the facility would be partially maximum security.

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Hamilton County Commissioner Phil Heimlich also approached the Board said he wished to speak in favor of the ¼ cent sales tax to build the jail. He said we have struggled with the problem of releasing criminals early from the jail because of lack of space. He asked for the Board's support of the sales tax increase, noting that Green, Springfield, and Sycamore Townships have endorsed it. This is a sales tax, but coupled with a property tax roll back. The COAST group and all law enforcement groups in the County have endorsed it. He said that it is inexcusable that we do not have jail space to house the criminals. Cincinnati has surpassed Detroit with population loss. He said that we must have jail space to house the criminals.

PUBLIC HEARING

Mr. Foglesong said the Colerain Township Board of Trustees was presented with a petition on July 21, 2006, for a lighting district located on the Summercrest Subdivision within the Township. The required 51% front footage signatures have been received with 100% in favor. The cost of the lighting to each property owner is about \$82.38 per month. There is currently one parcel. Five new lights are to be installed on Summercrest Subdivision after September 1, 2006, as scheduled by Duke Energy.

2. Rolling Oaks I Lighting District

Mr. Foglesong said the Colerain Township Board of Trustees was presented with a petition on July 14, 2006, for a lighting district located on Rolling Oaks Court within the Township. The required 51% front footage signatures have been received with 100% in favor. The cost of the lighting to each property owner is about \$69.96 per month. There is currently one parcel. There will be 10 property owners within this district once the parcel is divided. The cost will then be \$6.99/month. Two new lights are to be installed on Rolling Oaks Court after September 1, 2006, as scheduled by Duke Energy.

No one wished to speak before the Board on this matter. Mr. Fiedeldey motioned to close the public address and Mr. Ritter offered the second.

3. Locustview (Rolling Oaks II) Lighting District

Mr. Foglesong said the Colerain Township Board of Trustees was presented with a petition on July 14, 2006, for a lighting district located on Locust View Lane within the Township. The required 51% front footage signatures have been received with 100% in favor. The cost of the lighting to each property owner is about \$37.96 per month. There is currently one parcel. There will be 90 property owners within this district once the parcel is divided. The cost will then be \$4.21/month. One new light is to be installed on Locust View Lane after September 1, 2006, as scheduled by Duke Energy.

No one wished to speak before the Board on this matter. Mr. Fiedeldey motioned to close the public address and Mr. Ritter offered the second.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Lt. Mark Schoonover gave the reports to Chief Sarver.

TRUSTEE REPORTS

MR. RITTER

At last month's meeting, the Board acted decisively. Three work groups were created: creation of property maintenance code, plain clothes police unit, section 8 housing/CMHA housing. Each workgroup assigned to one of the trustees. At each meeting, the trustees will give an update on the workgroup's progress. Mr. Ritter said that he is working with the section 8 group, with Frank Birkenhauer; Judy Hinterlong, a citizen; as well as representatives from the Police Department, Lt. Dan Meloy, and Neighborhood Resource Officers.

He said they have checked with other jurisdictions, mapped the units to see if there is a correlation between the section 8 units and crime. He said it is important to hold CMHA accountable to their own requirements and long-term strategies.

MR. FIEDELDEY

Mr. Fiedeldey said he has met with Dr. Roschke, Mrs. Bancroft, Mr. Quinn, and Mr. Reuter about the property maintenance code. He said the code must be recognized in the state, but we have a sample code which will comply. We must get legal definitions for the code, which we must be sure are within the law. He hopes to present this at the September meeting, with possible adoption at the

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first meeting in October. They are working on some the details, but have determined that the citations will be found in a methodical way, for example, if citations will be found by sweep or complaint only. He said that we would offer a six month moratorium to allow property owners time to repair their property. He said this has a lot to do with property values in general.

Mr. Fiedeldey said the Southern Ohio Dog & Game Protective Society is celebrating its 75th anniversary. To mark the occasion, he read a proclamation which made August 9, 2006, as Southern Ohio Dog and Game Protective Society day in Colerain Township. Mr. Fiedeldey also presented a certificate. The group's president, Warner Moore, thanked the Board for the honor, on behalf of the organization's 1,000 members.

MR. CORMAN

Mr. Corman offered an update on the plain clothes unit. He said that he has addressed some of the fiscal issues and is meeting with Sheriff Leis tomorrow to talk about logistical issues.

Mr. Corman said that it is important to show the Board stands united on these three issues, before they move forward. This Board is unanimous in this decision. He said they are moving forward with unity, especially with the public. He said it is important to be sure it is done right, but it might move slowly.

Mr. Corman recognized the two German organizations in the Township in light of upcoming events.

First, at the Donauschwaben Society, Sunday, August 13 is Donauschwaben Tag. With a proclamation, he recognized the organization's contributions to the community and declared August 13 as Donauschwaben Tag in Colerain Township.

Mr. Corman also offered recognition to a retired employee, Mr. Alvin Meyer. Mr. Meyer had 28 years with Township. He is a servant to the people and a true American hero.

CITIZEN ADDRESS

Judy Hinterlong of 9402 Coogan Drive addressed the Board with her neighbors. She has lived in Colerain for 40 years. She said that she and her neighbors built Colerain Township. Now they have this influx forced on them, which is ruining their neighbors and schools. She said there is a deep perception that no one is hearing them. She said that these are quality of life issues. She said they need to know that they are being heard.

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Pat Allen, 2412 Garrison said that she is growing tired of what is happening. They are tired of not having justice, tired of calling and not having anyone come or having them not take action. She said there is also a problem with the curfew not being enforced. She said there are groups of juveniles with home-made weapons. She said that both school districts are looking for levies, but she will not vote for the Mt. Healthy levy because they do not have appropriate proficiency levels. Parents must be responsible for getting their kids in school. She said they are not getting anywhere with the police because the offenders have learned to play the game and they have the listening devices to know when the police are coming. She said they have drug dealers on the street. She said they will not put up with it much longer.

Bill Grauch of 2527 Arroka Drive has been a resident for 18 years. His home is his biggest investment and he wants to protect it. He said his neighborhood is looking more like Over the Rhine, not Colerain Township. He has found kids and their bikes playing in his driveway while he is not home. He said the parents are not respectful. He is looking at moving out of the county.

Pat Daniel of 2453 Garrison wants to protect her neighborhood and they are united in wanting their houses back. She wants her kids to be able to play. She has tried to be a good neighbor and has voted for the Township's fire and police levies. Will the Township vote for their neighborhood? They have worked hard for their homes and have pride in them. She said they used to trust her neighbors, but now afraid to come home at night. She asked the Board for help. She has lived there for over 40 years.

Jim Brunsman of 9231 Coogan has lived in area for 48 years. They owned their first home in Northbrook, and then moved over to Coogan. He said it has been a good neighborhood, but the last five years have been deteriorating. They can call the police, but is there anything else they can do? He said that kids coming in from another neighborhoods. They are standing on street corners in gangs. The curfew is not being enforced.

Bernie Brunsman of 9231 Coogan lives catty corner from one of the section 8 houses. Tenants evicted over the weekend and there is now a for rent sign. She said the small children are not being disciplined, but the older children are a problem as well. She raised 9 children there.

Thelma Giler of 9458 Coogan has only lived there five years and has seen a total neighborhood change. She said the curfew needs to be lowered from midnight to 9 or 10. She said she used to live in the inner city and moved here to escape those problems.

Robert Sparks of 9622 Sacramento has lived there for eight years. He said that for the last 3-4 years, the neighborhood is going way down hill. He van and car been egged on the street and a street sign stolen. He has witnessed drug deals on the street.

Harold Roberts of 9273 Neil Drive has lived there for 31 years and raised two kids. He has six surveillance cameras on house. He has a CCW license and carries while walking his dogs. He said the neighborhood is getting rough and they need help.

James Tritsch of 9453 Coogan has lived there for 12 years. He said that he has great neighbors. It is a nice place to live and he wants to keep the property values up. He knows of the problems and sees the drug deals, but didn't realize

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it was this bad. He said his is proud of Colerain Township, especially what we have done with the Colerain Ave. corridor.

Mr. Corman said the three committees work together. Mr. Ritter said they recognized the problems last month and this one of the three prongs. We know there is a problem, but are only two meetings into the initiative. He said that Officers Sevier and Sharp have a lot of good ideas. We're going to get there. Mr. Ritter said that they will make a stand for our community.

Chief Sarver said the Department sympathizes with the public. There are only a set number of officers to respond: there are 6 police officers on the street, covering 44 square miles and 60,000 citizens. During his time as chief, the department has increased by 10 officers. They have added the Neighborhood Resource Officers, 2nd officers in the schools and the bike team. The curfew has resulted in 640 arrests in 2 years. He said that the officers will not risk personal injury to run after a juvenile, but will get them another day. The plain clothes unit will work with many of these issues. He pointed out that only 4 families on the streets are on vouchers, according to CMHA. From May 1 to Sunday, they received 75 calls for service to those 5 streets. Only twice were they called to a Section 8 house. Chief Sarver said it is not necessarily section 8, but society in general. They are aware of the problem, but working to resolve it. He said the community has not asked for a Block Watch, but the department will help them set this up. He offered to do a blitz on the neighborhood. Please give them time and cooperation.

Mr. Fiedeldey said the letter distributed in the community says only one Trustee cares about this. He does care about this. The Board is unified on this. He wishes the neighbors would have been here 3 or 4 years ago. He said the Board is already starting to work on it and appreciates their support. He suggested the neighborhood start a Block Watch. He stressed that they are not ignoring them, but this will take six months to get the old clothes unit operational.

Mr. Corman said that Chief Sarver is correct in trying to single out section 8 housing. The program has been abused and it is failing. He now works in the domestic relations court. On the floors above them is juvenile court. He has seen an increase in both courts. He said they need more law enforcement, especially with the drug situation. He stood hard for the curfew, but there was opposition to it within the Township. He said they will do what it takes to get the job done, but he does not want to have laws passed where the good people have to lose their freedoms.

A man offered to start the block watch. He will talk with Officer Sevier.

Kimberly Pratt of 1722 Kinney Ave. in Mt. Healthy asked if Colerain Township and Springfield Township ever work together. She feels the juveniles are coming from other jurisdictions. Chief Sarver said they share information, but are not able to share resources. He attends a Chiefs Association meeting monthly. She asked about the junk car and weed abatement resolutions. Mr. Fiedeldey explained these processes and stressed that you can call anonymously 385-7505. Dr. Roschke requested that callers have the exact address of the property.

Kim Landenwitsch of 9124 Coogan Drive has lived there for 12 years. Her children are honor roll students. She said they need to participate and pass the school levies. We must keep our schools up or the neighborhood will go down. She said that they need to look at the grand picture.

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Mr. Fiedeldey said the curfew was mentioned earlier. He said that he and Mr. Corman fought hard to get it. Mr. Ritter was not on the Board when this was passed.

Mr. Corman thanked everyone for coming. At 9:21PM, Mr. Ritter motioned for a recess, Mr. Fiedeldey offered the second.

Haverknoll Drive Storm Sewer

In response to the Haverknoll Drive storm water issues that were brought before the Board at the June 13 and July 11 meetings, Mr. McClain offered an update. The storm sewer system draining storm water from the intersection of Pippin Road and West Kemper Road is functioning properly. The rear properties along the southside of Haverknoll Drive are not getting additional surface storm water from this intersection. In response to Mrs. Victoria Hayes (2673 Haverknoll) and Mr. Dalton Vans (2665 Haverknoll), storm surface water issue, there is a swale along the east rear property line of 2681 Haverknoll Drive that is in need of cleaning and re-defining. Mr. McClain said that his department has met with a property owner representative and they have agreed to make the necessary corrections. The Department has either met with or attempted to reach all other property owners who have contacted the Township regarding surface storm water concerns in an effort to resolve their questions and concerns.
